








Confirmed Cases and Deaths by County

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PROCLAMATION BY THE GOVERNOR AMENDING AND EXTENDING PROCLAMATIONS 20-05 AND 20-24

20-24.1

Reducing Restrictions on, and Safe Expansion of, Non-Urgent Medical and Dental Procedures

WHEREAS, on February 29, 2020, I issued Proclamation 20-05, proclaiming a State of Emergency for all counties throughout Washington as a result of the coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) outbreak in the United States and confirmed person-to-person spread of COVID-19 in Washington State; and

WHEREAS, as a result of the continued worldwide spread of COVID-19, its significant progression




New Proclamation: Non-Urgent Procedures


- Monday's new Proclamation by the Governor
 - Extends and amends proclamations 20-05 and 20-24
 - State of Emergency still in effect
- Reducing restrictions is part of state's larger "Safe Start" recovery plans
- Resumption of procedures requires:
 - Local assessments
 - At least 20% surge capacity
 - Clinical judgement by health care professionals related to essential patient care
 - Continuous monitoring of PPE, ventilators and other supplies
 - COVID-19 testing and notification
 - Etc.



PPE Supply Chain










Long-Term Care Update


- PPE for in-home health care workers was moved to Tier 1 in April
 - 500,000 cloth face coverings continue to be distributed to individual providers and home care agencies
- DSHS signed a contract for a 5th COVID-only nursing home unit –
 Avalon Health and Rehabilitation Center (Pasco)

Testing Update

- State received 112,000 nasopharyngeal flocked swabs from FEMA on Saturday (May 16)
- Supposed to receive 430,000 transport media (VTM or saline) for May (and every month) but none received to date
- Summary: We have received 30% of promised swabs and 0% of promised transport media for May
